

We are also seeing how the pandemic has exacerbated an already existing mental health

crisis in youth. Before the pandemic, one in rimental five children had a mental health problem, and children. rive cinuren isaa a mentat reaun prooten, and sucicide was the second leading cause of death in children beginning at age 10. Now, youth with mental health concerns are pouring into our pediatric primary care offices.

Some refuse to leave their homes because

are experiencing excessive grief due to losses they experienced while others worry about whether their parents' unemployment threat-ens their housing or what they will eat.

more children screen positive for mental health concerns, and more the nor mentan neath concerns, and more children say they are having thoughts about suicide. School-aged children tell us they would rather die than live in a world with COVID-19. Social isolation is a risk factor for suicidal behaviors, while feeling connected

and engaged in school and activities are pro-tective factors. Our youth are isolated right now with so much uncertainty about the future, making it harder to cultivate hope and resilience during these times.

Across the country, too many children might not even see a specialist or stay in the emergency room for days waiting for one of the few inpatient psychiatry beds that are still open, a dire shortage that has only worsened with the pandernic.



We must ensure schools receive funding to provide essential healthy meals to families and physical activity outdoors or virtually. We should be urgently vaccinating teens 16 and over, and every pediatric clinic should have the Pfizer vaccine available for that group, with the Pizzer vaccine available for that group, with plans to rapidly vaccinate younger children be-fore the next school year as soon as a vaccine is authorized for younger ages. Children are our future, and we must prior-itize their well-being right now.


